

FROM THE DESK OF FR. ERIC ANDERSEN

St. Francis de Sales called Mount Calvary "the mountain of lovers," and says that the love which springs not from the Passion is weak; meaning that the Passion of Jesus Christ is the most powerful incentive to inflame us to love our Savior. The flame of love is something we encounter when the Holy Spirit fills our souls with sanctifying grace. The flame, or ardor, of love is gift we offer back to the Lord. We may consider that the sanctuary lamp is a flame burning as a sign of our love for the Lord in His Eucharistic presence among us. It is necessary that a sanctuary lamp always burn in the presence of the Lord's Eucharistic presence in a Catholic church. The beauty of the sanctuary lamp and the flame burning on the sanctuary candle can well be a sign of the ardor of love we offer back to the Lord.

The High Altar, and the steps leading up to it, represents not only the holy mountain of the Lord's crucifixion: Mount Calvary, the "mountain of lovers" according to St. Francis de Sales; but it also represents the heavenly Jerusalem and the heavenly throne of the Most High God. From the side of Christ on the Cross, His Precious Blood and water flowed like a fountain of mercy for sinners. It is only fitting that the High Altar, and the Tabernacle where the Eucharist is kept, be enthroned in majestic splendor. With that in mind, you may have witnessed the marvelous new sanctuary lamp hanging in front of the High Altar. This sanctuary lamp is a historic lamp which once hung in the chapel of the Benedictine Sisters at Queen of Angels Convent in Mount Angel, Oregon.

This sanctuary lamp evokes a majesty fitting to the Most High upon His Eucharistic throne. As the flame beckons all who can see to come forward to adore His Majesty-Our King and Lord Jesus Christ—so it captivates our attention and assures us that He is always with us. "In the Old Testament God commanded that a lamp filled with the purest oil of olives should always burn in the Tabernacle of the Testimony (outside) the veil (Exodus 27:20, 21). The Church prescribes that at least one lamp should continually burn before the tabernacle (Rit. Rom. iv, 6), not only as an ornament of the altar, but for the purpose of worship. It is also a mark of honour. It is to remind the faithful of the presence of Christ, and is a profession of their <u>love</u> and affection. Mystically it signifies <u>Christ</u>, for by this material light He is represented who is the "true light which enlighteneth every man" (Iohn 1:9) (Catholic Encyclopedia Vol. I). We are very grateful to have the opportunity to honor our Resurrected Lord with such a beautiful sanctuary lamp. The original lamp at St. Stephen's was very similar to this new one. It hung in the church until the late 1950s, when it was replaced by the small one that has hung on the side wall of the sanctuary. We have retired that lamp hung in the 1950s as of Holy Thursday and at the Solemn Easter Vigil we have 'resurrected' this splendid historic lamp which will both unite us with our own history and give new life to this lamp which was once so prominent in Mount Angel. It is an Easter gift to the Lord and to us. I wish you to all a very blessed Sunday of the Praised be Jesus Christ, now and Resurrection. forever. Amen.

EASTER SUNDAY VESPERS AT 5:00 PM

A festive way to round out this great day!

Join us for a special service of Vespers for the Resurrection of Our Lord. We'll be joined by guest singers and a guest Baroque string trio, who will embellish the celebration with glorious music written for the Catholic liturgy. For centuries, the public service of Vespers was de rigueur in all parishes, especially on major feast days. Even Unitarian New Englander John Adams, after attending Vespers in 1774 during the Continental Congress in Philadelphia (one of the only places where public Catholic worship was legal in the 13 Colonies), noted that "a choir of singers chanted most sweetly and exquisitely" and had to admit that "the scenery and the music are so calculated to take in mankind that I wonder the Reformation ever succeeded." So, bring your friends and relatives, since even non-Catholics will be able to join in all the prayers or simply enjoy the beauty of the psalms and Our Lady's hymn, the Magnificat. As with all of our liturgies, the cultivation of beauty is integral to our participation in the truth and goodness of God's plan of salvation. This realm of ineffable mystery, grandeur, and sanctity exists not only in the sacraments, but also in the Divine Office, our response to Saint Paul's exhortation to "rejoice always [and] pray without ceasing" Thessalonians 5:16). Often lost amid the myriad liturgical changes following the Second Vatican Council is the unequivocal instruction in its first decree, the Constitution of the Sacred Liturgy, that "Pastors of souls should see to it that the principal hours, especially Vespers, are celebrated in common on Sundays and on the more solemn feasts" (Sacrosanctum Concilium, 100). We're fortunate to be able to offer this pattern of liturgies, both for our own parish and for all the people of Portland. Help us in the beautiful endeavor of keeping the Lord's Day holy!

FIRST FRIDAY MASS & DEVOTIONS

St. Stephen's offers a monthly First Friday Mass at 7 pm in the Extraordinary Form. This is a Low Votive Mass of the Sacred Heart preceded by Confessions at 6:00 pm and followed by the praying of the Act of Consecration to the Sacred Heart of Jesus (by St. Margaret Mary Alocoque), and the Litany of the Sacred Heart. Please join us this month on **Friday, April 6th.**

FIRST SATURDAY MASS & DEVOTIONS

On First Saturdays, we pray an Act of Reparation for First Saturdays after Mass followed by the Rosary during Confessions. This devotion "consists in going to Confession, receiving Communion, reciting five decades of the Rosary and meditating for a quarter of an hour on the mysteries of the Rosary on the first Saturday. Confession may be made during the eight days preceding or following the first Saturday of each month, provided that Holy Communion be received in the state of grace. Should one forget to form the intention of making reparation to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, it may be formed at the next Confession, the occasion to go to confession being taken at the first opportunity." Please join us this month after morning mass on Saturday, April 7th.
