FROM THE DESK OF FR. ERIC ANDERSEN

Humanae Vitae: 50 years (1968-2018)

2018 marks 50 years since Pope Paul VI wrote the 1968 encyclical entitled *Humanae Vitae* on the Regulation of Births. This fiftieth year is a good opportunity to look back upon this encyclical and the Church's perennial wisdom in her teaching on marriage and the begetting and rearing of children. In order to assent to the Church's teaching, we must know the Church's teaching. Pope Paul VI wrote: "since, in the attempt to justify artificial methods of birth control, many have appealed to the demands both of conjugal love and of 'responsible parenthood', it is good to state very precisely the true concept of these two great realities of married life..." (Humanae Vitae ¶7).

He continued: "It is of the highest importance to have an exact understanding of (the) marks and requirements" of conjugal love (*Humanae Vitae* ¶9):

"This love is first of all fully *human*; that is to say, it pertains at the same time to both sense and spirit. It is not, then a simple transport of instinct and feelings but also, and principally, an act of the free will, destined to endure and to grow by means of the joys and sorrows of daily life, in such a way that husband and wife become one heart and one soul, and together attain their perfection." (¶9)

"And this love is *total;* that is to say, it is a very special form of personal friendship, in which husband and wife generously share everything, without undue reservations or selfish calculations. Whoever truly loves his spouse, does not love her only for what he receives from her, but for herself, happy to be able to enrich her with the gift of himself." (¶9)

"This love is also *faithful* and *exclusive* until death. Such in fact do bride and groom conceive it to be on the day when they freely and with full awareness assume the duty of the marriage bond. A fidelity, this, that can be at times difficult, but which is always possible, always noble and meritorious, as no one can deny." (¶9)

"Finally, this love is *fruitful*, for it is not exhausted by the communion between husband and wife, but is destined to perpetuate itself, bringing new lives into existence. 'Marriage and conjugal love are by their nature ordained to the begetting and rearing of children. Indeed, children are the most precious gift of marriage and contribute immensely to the good of the parents themselves."' (¶9) (to be continued...)

SINGING PSALMS

The 150 psalms form the Church's original and most enduring song book. Indeed, our liturgies fold them into every part of our corporate prayer. This is especially true in the *Divine Office* or *Liturgy of the Hours*, which are centered on the singing of psalms in weekly and monthly cycles. And while the psalms are an inexhaustible font of poetic responses to God's plan of salvation, they actually are 'free verse' without regular metrical patterns of word accents, rhyme, or fixed line lengths. As a result, in both ancient Judaic practice and Christian tradition, a fixed number of flexible patterns or formulas known as *psalm tones* allows us to sing the great variety of psalm text-forms with consistency and attention to natural word accents. This workshop will show how the traditional psalm tones work with both Latin and English texts. Once your ear, eye, and voice are working in *harmonious synchrony*, the *psalter* truly becomes a path to truth, beauty, and goodness! Join us on **Sunday, February 4**, at 3:45 pm!
