FROM THE DESK OF FR. ERIC ANDERSEN

Humanae Vitae 50 Years 1968-2018 (continued from last week)

Let's look at the context in which Pope Paul VI wrote *Humanae Vitae*. We need to look back to the year 1930. Brian Clowes writes: "Until 1930 all Christian churches were unanimous in their opposition to artificial means of birth prevention. The first crack in the dam was the Anglican Bishop's Lambeth Conference of August 15, 1930. This Resolution said, in part, "...in those cases where there is such a clearly felt moral obligation to limit or avoid parenthood, and where there is a morally sound reason for avoiding complete abstinence, the Conference agrees that other (contraceptive) methods may be used, provided that this is done in the light of the same Christian principles" (Clowes, Brian. The Facts of Life. Front Royal, VA: Human Life International, 2001. p. 50).

Pope Pius XI issued a response in the form of an Encyclical entitled *Casti Cannubi* on Christian Marriage promulgated Dec 31st, 1930. He wrote about the "evils opposed to each of the benefits of matrimony":

"First consideration is due to the offspring, which many have the boldness to call the disagreeable burden of matrimony, and which they say is to be carefully avoided by married people not through virtuous continence...but by frustrating the marriage act. Some justify this criminal abuse on the ground that they are weary of children and wish to gratify their desires without their consequent burden. Others say that they cannot on the one hand remain continent, nor on the other can they have children, because of the difficulties whether on the part of the mother or on the part of family circumstances" (¶53).

"But no reason, however, grave, may be put forward by which anything intrinsically against nature may become conformable to nature and morally good. Since, therefore, the conjugal act is destined primarily by nature for the begetting of children, those who in exercising it deliberately frustrate its natural power and purpose, sin against nature and commit a deed which is shameful and intrinsically vicious (¶54). ...any use whatsoever of matrimony exercised in such a way that the act is deliberately frustrated in its natural power to generate life is an offense against the law of God and of nature, and those who indulge in such are branded with the guilt of a grave sin" (¶56).

A few months later, in March 1931, the United States Federal Council of Churches followed the lead of the Anglican bishops endorsing "the careful and restrained use of contraceptives by married people," while at the same time conceding that "serious evils, such as extramarital…relations, may be increased by general knowledge of contraceptions" (cf. Clowes, p. 50).

The secular press now spoke in opposition: "the 22 March 1931 *Washington Post* editorialized that 'Carried to its logical conclusion, the committee's report, if carried into effect, would sound the death-knell of marriage as a holy institution by establishing degrading practices which would encourage indiscriminate immorality. The suggestion that the use of legalized contraceptives would be "careful and restrained" is preposterous" (qtd. 50). (to be continued)

This workshop will show how the traditional psalm tones work with both Latin and English texts.
