FROM THE DESK OF FR ERIC ANDERSEN

Advent is kind of like Lent, but not as strict. I was reminded this week, while praying the Divine Office, about the character of the Advent season. Praying the liturgy of the Church forms us in the Christian life. It certainly forms a priest in the way he lives his life. Here is how praying the Traditional Roman Breviary and Mass forms a priest to understand Advent in relation to Lent. All the examples given will refer to the Divine Office, Mass and disciplines in place in 1962 according to the "Extraordinary Form" of the Roman Rite.

First example: During Lent, there are few feast days that are celebrated. Most feasts during Lent are observed only as commemorations so they do not interrupt the penitential practices of Lent. During Advent there are lots of Feast days observed for various saints: St. Nicholas, St. Lucy, etc. During Advent, these feasts interrupt the penitential practices of Advent. On Ferias of Advent (weekdays with no feast), Lauds is penitential like it is during Lent, following the second scheme of Psalms. These include the daily praying of the Miserere (Ps. 50(51)) and, on Wednesdays and Fridays, the long litany of invocations called the *Preces* (meaning prayers).

Second example: Beginning with Septuagesima (the three Sundays preceding Ash Wednesday), the *Alleluia* is suppressed and not uttered during the Liturgy until Easter. It is the same for the *Gloria* at Mass and the *Te Deum* in the Office of Matins in the Divine Office. This rule is strict for the Alleluia, however the Gloria and *Te Deum* are prayed if a rare feast comes along. During Advent, the *Alleluia* is spoken on Sundays and on feast days, but not on regular weekdays of Advent, when the Alleluia is suppressed. Likewise, the *Gloria* is not sung during Advent except on Feasts when it is prayed. Likewise, the *Te Deum* is not prayed on Sundays during Advent, but it is prayed on the many feast days that fall during this time.

Third example: During every day of Lent, except Sundays and Solemnities, fasting is the discipline with partial abstinence from meat every day (except Sunday) and complete abstinence on Fridays. During Advent, there is complete abstinence on Fridays and on the Vigil of Christmas (Dec 24th) and there is fasting during the Ember Days of Advent – which will fall this year on Wednesday, December 18th, Friday, December 20th, and Saturday, December 21st; as well as fasting on the Vigil of Christmas (aka Christmas Eve – Dec 24th).

Observing all these differences, one can see that Advent has a bit of the flavor of Lent, but without the rigor until we get to the last part of Advent. The last part of Advent, from December 17th - 24th gets more serious. These are called the Greater Days of Advent and they include only one feast to interrupt the austerity of these final days before the Nativity of the Lord. Every other day is focused on the mystery at hand.

The lesson we can all learn from this is that Christmas parties should have no place during these last greater days of Advent when fasting and abstinence are the discipline. But we should observe the various feast days of our favorite saints during Advent. They are part of the preparation and they each have their festivities appropriate to the season. But consider refraining from the early celebration of Christmas at parties on those Ember Fast Days before Christmas - Wednesday, Friday and Saturday Dec 18th, 20th, and 21st. The temptation will be to begin early. Remember that there are 12 days of Christmas to enjoy between Dec 25th and Epiphany on January 6th and by extension, there are forty days of Christmas lasting until February 2nd. Let the anticipation build and let us be vigilant in keeping watch for the coming of the Lord at Midnight on December 25th.
