

HEADSETS AVAILABLE DURING MASS IN THE NARTHEX OF THE CHURCH

FROM THE DESK OF FR ERIC ANDERSEN

The season of Advent begins in darkness. though it is still dark, the night has passed and as the Blessed Apostle tells us, it is now the hour for us to rise from sleep. By Tradition, we believe that Christ was born at Midnight, and that He will come again at Midnight. The parable of the wise and foolish virgins tells us that the Bridegroom returns at midnight. The five wise virgins were ready and five foolish ones were not. We need to be wise which means to be prepared, to be vigilant, to be ready. Perhaps this is why we have a tradition of blessing and lighting candles during the Advent season. The blessing of candles communicates quite well that the darkness will not prevail. There are a couple of blessings for candles throughout the liturgical year, but traditionally, there is no blessing for Advent candles, aside from the devotional prayer prayed by the father of a family in the home, similar to a blessing at meals:

O God, by Whose word all things are sanctified, pour forth Thy blessing upon this wreath and grant that we who use it may prepare our hearts for the coming of Christ and may receive from Thee abundant graces.

We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

But when a priest blesses candles, he says in Latin these words:

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the living God, bless + these candles at our lowly request.

Endow them, Lord, by the power of the holy + cross, with a blessing from on high, you who gave them to mankind in order to dispel darkness.

Let the blessing that they receive from the sign of the holy + cross be so effectual that, wherever they are lighted or placed, the princes of darkness may depart in trembling from all these places, and flee in fear, along with all their legions, and never more dare to disturb or molest those who serve you, the almighty God, who live and reign forever and ever.

Amen

When candles are used liturgically, they are to be made of beeswax, or at least with a majority of beeswax. The candles we use on the altar are made of 51% beeswax. The wax of bees is said to resemble the flesh of Jesus Christ, because worker bees are virgins and they produce wax to feed the baby bees. Compare this with Blessed Mary who was a virgin who brought forth the Holy Child Jesus, whose flesh (the Eucharist) feeds the children of God, the faithful of the Church. The wick of the candle is compared with the soul of Christ; while the flame is compared to His divinity. As we light the candles on our advent wreaths let us recall the light of Christ who scatters the darkness.
