FROM THE DESK OF FR ERIC ANDERSEN

Today is known as "Bastille Day" among the French. Many people think that this is the French equivalent for the 4th of July, considering it to be French Independence Day. For a Catholic, July 14th is not a day to celebrate with glee. It is a day to mourn the dead. It is a day to mourn the loss of France as a Christian nation. One may, however, celebrate the martyrs of the French Revolution. This coming Wednesday, the Carmelite Order celebrates the 16 Carmelite Nuns known as the Martyrs of Compiegne. They were convicted for treason and executed at the guillotine on July 17th, 1794.

This particular carmel had close ties to the French Monarchy, being located just opposite the royal chateau of Versailles. Marie Antoinette was very religious and spent much time with Carmelite nuns. The French nation turned against the Catholic Church because in the minds of the atheists, Catholic identity was synonymous with patriotism in the Ancienne Regime. The new regime seized church property, expelled religious from their monasteries and convents, forbade the wearing of religious garb, and established a National Religion to the god of Reason. In doing so, they defiled the sanctuary at Notre Dame Cathedral by enthroning a prostitute in the place of God and paying homage to her. Priests and nuns were required to sign the Constitutional Oath. Those who did not risked arrest and even execution for treason. The Carmelites of Compiegne were arrested in the end as "religious fanatics" for owning an image of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. In court, they were told that "because of their attachment to their religion, they were regarded as criminals and annihilators of public freedom" (cf. Bush, <u>To Quell the Terror</u>. 63). They were imprisoned on June 22, 1794 and forced to wear civilian clothing.

On July 12th, "the nuns received permission from their captors to wash their single outfit of civilian clothing on the 21st day of their imprisonment" (168). The nuns took off their civilian outfits to wash them and, lacking a change of civilian clothing, had no alternative but to put on their habits, which they had preserved and brought with them to prison. Suddenly the mayor and his party burst in, attended by soldiers, to depart immediately for the Paris tribunal. Their clothes were soaking and a delay of one day was impossible. It was thus that the Carmelite nuns went to court and to the scaffold in brown habits and white mantels, shocking the crowds who normally shouted and jeered the enemies of the Republic who came to be beheaded. Accounts of the day, however, report a notable silence at the appearance of the

The executioner treated the nuns with great respect, allowing the Mother superior to finish the community's devotions before execution. Thus, the sisters sang the *Te Deum*, a song of thanksgiving to God, and followed that with the devotions "normal for a dying Carmelite," in which each sister renewed "her monastic vows of poverty, chastity and obedience, her hands between those of the prioress" (208). Meanwhile, the sisters all sang the *Veni Creator Spiritus*. After this community consecration, each sister came to Mother Teresa of St. Augustine to ask permission to die as she prepared to ascend the scaffold. During the executions, the community sang *Laudate Dominum omnes gentes*. The choir continued and Mother Teresa, as Mother and prioress came last. So it was that on July 17, 1794, 16 Carmelite nuns offered themselves for France and the Church. 10 days later on July 27th, the Terror ended.

These nuns offered their lives as public witnesses to the Gospel, as brides of Jesus Christ, pleading with God and trusting in Him for the salvation of souls and the French Nation. They are examples not only of heroic virtue, but of true patriotism.
