#### FROM THE DESK OF FR ERIC ANDERSEN

#### Update: Various Restoration & Maintenance Projects

I regularly have people ask me how the Communion Rail project is coming along. Here is the update: It is coming along. One of the difficulties has been figuring out which materials to use. At one point, we looked at having it done in wood, and faux painted in black marble. With such a large expanse across the front of the sanctuary, it was clear that it needed various structural supports along the way in order to stand securely. As we considered various options for these very practical details, it became more and more clear that materials ready made and available at local suppliers was not the way to go: we needed to have it designed by a professional. We have the design for the gates. The railing also needs a design. The communion rail needs to be permanent and needs to match the quality of everything else in the sanctuary. It would be an insult to God and to the parish if it looked cheap or temporary. Now, we have a designer who is drafting a plan that can be carried out by a contractor.

When the baptismal gates were installed, they looked so good, that the idea of using wrought iron for the communion rail came up. What we are looking at now, is a design that is modeled after the communion rail at St. Mary's Cathedral in NW Portland. Their original communion rail and gates are now used for their baptistry. The white marble is the same white Carrera marble used at St. Stephen's on our high altar. The design we are looking at would incorporate white Carrera marble end posts like the ones at the Cathedral. In between these posts would be black wrought iron in the same design as the iron work in our new baptistry. Along the top of the railing would be a shelf of black Carrera marble like that used on the gradines of our high altar at St. Stephen's. There will be three gates: a single gate in front of the Mary altar; a double gate in the center; and a single gate in front of the St. Joseph altar. The design is coming together and I hope that I can have something to present to vou soon.

We have a gift that was given specifically to pay for the sanctuary project, but we have another urgent project that has come up: the street side porch in front of Carmody Hall (the gym). This is the original church building which was three stories tall. After the first fire of 1914, there was a second fire in 1931 and the building was modified after this. Where there were originally stairs leading up to the main floor, there is now an entrance at street level. The cement throughout this area has been quickly deteriorating, especially along the side walls that hold back the dirt which rises up to the ground level on both sides of the entrance. There are serious deep cracks in the cement that threaten to detach entire sections of the wall that are After consulting with some beginning to bulge. parishioners who do construction work and with the Archdiocese it seems advisable to act on this project right away before the rains and replace the cement altogether as a preventive measure. It is a gamble to wait until next summer and that gamble could turn it into a \$100,000+ project if the porch and roof were to be affected.

# PHILOSOPHY NIGHT ON THE LATIN LANGUAGE

Thursday, September 26th, 2019 at 7 pm. Fr. Eric Andersen will present this month's topic: "Latin: Universal, Immutable & Non-Vernacular." In 1962, Pope John XXIII promulgated the encyclical Veterum Sapientia on the promotion of the Latin language, writing: "Of its very nature Latin is most suitable for promoting every form of culture among peoples. It gives rise to no jealousies. It does not favor any one nation but presents itself with equal impartiality to all and is equally acceptable to all." The Holy Father went on to argue that the Latin language, because it is universal, immutable, and non-vernacular, needs to be preserved and promoted in the Church as her own language.
