### FROM THE DESK OF FR ERIC ANDERSEN

#### Moveable Feasts of the Christmas Season

The Christmas Season is probably the most tricky when it comes to balancing two liturgical calendars. In order to understand this, take a look at the two calendars side by side according to this year's dates:

	1962 Calendar	1970 Calendar
12/29	Sunday in the Octave	Holy Family
1/1	Octave Day	Mary Mother of God
1/3	Christmas Weekday	Holy Name of Jesus
1/5	Holy Name of Jesus	Epiphany (USA)
1/6	Epiphany	St. André Bessette (USA)
1/12	Holy Family	Baptism of the Lord
1/13	Baptism of the Lord	Ordinary Time

As you can see, there are variations between the two calendars which require us to celebrate the same feast sometimes more than once in the year. In case you are wondering, the Feast of Mary, Mother of God is celebrated in the 1962 calendar on October 11th which is the anniversary of the proclamation of the Dogma of Mary, Mother of God at the Council of Ephesus in the year 431.

We run into a similar situation on the last Sunday of October when we celebrate the Feast of Christ the King in the 1962 Missal and then we celebrate it again on the last Sunday of Ordinary Time before the beginning of Advent.

These various feasts in question originate in the recent pontificates of Pope Leo XIII and Pius XI. The Feast of Christ the King was promulgated in 1925 and placed on the Last Sunday in October to be in proximity to the Feasts of All Saints and All Souls who inhabit the Kingdom of Christ as the Church Triumphant and the Church Suffering. The feast was moved in 1969 to the Last Sunday of Ordinary Time to bring all things to their conclusion. But the meaning of the Feast changed with the move. Originally, the Feast was named to call all nations to give public worship to Christ the King. The emphasis on the Last Sunday of Ordinary Time changed to be a recognition of Christ as Judge at the Second Coming.

The Maternity of the Blessed Virgin Mary was introduced in 1931 to commemorate the 1500th Anniversary of the Council of Ephesus when the Dogma of Mary, Mother of God was defined. The Feast was moved in 1969 to the Octave Day of Christmas (January 1st) but the Gospel of the day remains that of the Circumcision of the Lord and the Naming of the Child Jesus.

The Feast of the Holy Family is another recent feast originating in 1893 and set on the Sunday within the Octave of the Epiphany (between January 7th and the 13th). The Missal of 1970 moved the Feast of the Holy Family to the Sunday in the Octave of Christmas and placed the Baptism of the Lord on the Sunday within the former Octave of the Epiphany. In the 1962 Calendar, the Baptism of the Lord is celebrated on January 13th, the Octave Day of the Epiphany.
