## FROM THE DESK OF FR ERIC ANDERSEN

### The Ember Days of Advent

This week, we observe three Ember Days (Wednesday, Friday and Saturday) in the traditional Roman calendar. Venerable Prosper Gueranger writes: "This observance is not peculiar to the Advent liturgy: it is one which has been fixed for each of the four seasons of the ecclesiastical year. We may consider it as one of those practices which the Church took from the Synagogue; for the prophet Zacharias speaks of the fasts of the fourth, fifth, seventh, and tenth months (Zach. viii, 19). Its introduction into the Christian Church would seem to have been made in the apostolic times; such, at least, is the opinion of St. Leo, of St. Isidore of Seville, of Rabanus Maurus, and of several other ancient Christian writers" (Gueranger, The Liturgical Year, Vol. I: Advent, p. 218).

These Ember Days are observed four times a year "to consecrate to God by penance the four seasons of the year" (219). Pope St. Leo "in one of his sermons on this fast...tells us that a special fast was fixed for this time of the year, because the fruits of the earth had then all been gathered in, and that it behoved Christians to testify their gratitude to God by a sacrifice of abstinence, thus rendering themselves more worthy to approach to God, the more they were detached from the love of created things. For fasting,' adds the holy doctor, 'has ever been the nourishment of virtue. Abstinence is the source of chaste thoughts, of wise resolutions, and of salutary counsel. By voluntary mortifications, the flesh dies to concupiscences, and the spirit is renewed in virtue. But since fasting alone is not sufficient whereby to secure the soul's salvation, let us add to it works of mercy towards the Let us make that which we retrench from indulgence, serve unto the exercise of virtue. Let the abstinence of him that fasts, become the meal of the poor man" (qtd. Gueranger, p. 219).

The Ember day fasts were in place from Apostolic times and made obligatory for all the faithful by Pope St. Calixtus I (217-222 AD), but in 1969, the four seasonal Ember weeks were removed from the Roman Missal. With the reintroduction of the Traditional Roman Rite and Calendar, many of the faithful are once again practicing these Ember fasts voluntarily, as a means of living out the liturgical year to its fullest and benefitting from its spiritual fruits. The Ember Day fasts are observed in the same manner as Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. One full meal at or around Noon, with a small collation in the morning and in the evening, not equaling a full second meal.

Ember Saturdays are traditionally the days on which priestly ordinations were celebrated. The December Ember Saturday is the original date for all priestly ordinations. "The primitive custom, in the Roman Church, was to hold ordinations in the night between Saturday and Sunday, just as Baptism was administered to the catechumens in the night between Holy Saturday and

## "Ember Days of Advent," continued

The ceremony took place towards midnight, and Sunday morning was always far advanced before the termination; so that the Mass of ordination was considered as the Mass of Sunday itself. Later on, discipline relaxed, and these severe vigils were given up; the ordination Mass, like that of Holy Saturday, was anticipated; and, as the fourth Sunday of Advent and the second of Lent had not hitherto had a proper Gospel, since they had not had a proper Mass, it was settled, about the tenth or eleventh century, that the Gospel of the Mass of ordinations should be repeated in the special Mass of the two Sundays in question." (p 230)

Let us pray for all of our seminarians this coming week and for all those preparing for ordination this coming year. Let us pray for all of our priests, especially those who were ordained in the month of December.
