FAST AND ABSTINENCE LAWS AND DISCIPLINES

The current law of the Church obliges those age 14 and over to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent. Those age 18 through 59 are also obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Fasting is defined as one full meal and two other meals which, when combined are less than a full meal.

The **former practice** and discipline in place in 1962 obliged those age 7 and over to full abstinence from meat on all Fridays of the year, Ash Wednesday, Holy Saturday, and the Vigil of Christmas (Christmas Eve).

Likewise, formerly, partial abstinence (meat permitted once a day at the principle meal): all the days of Lent, the Ember Days of Wednesday and Saturday, and the Vigils of Pentecost and the Assumption.

The **former law** for **fasting** applied to those age 21 through 59. Fasting was to be done on all days of Lent (except Sundays) from Ash Wednesday inclusive, Ember Days, and the Vigils of Christmas, Pentecost and the Assumption.

FROM THE DESK OF FR ERIC ANDERSEN

These last two weeks of Lent we witness the veiling of the sacred images and crucifixes in the church. The texts in the Mass and the Divine Office shift and our focus is increasingly now on the passion of Christ. In his book, the Hymns of the Roman Liturgy (1957), Fr. Joseph Connelly writes:

"Passiontide is a time of rejoicing as well as of mourning, of triumph as well as of defeat" (pg. 78). St. Augustine writes: "Consider the glory of the Cross itself. Now it is imprinted on the foreheads of kings, though enemies once insulted it. Its effects have witnessed to its power. It has subdued the world not by the sword but by the Tree" (6th lesson of Matins for Holy Thursday). "It is this triumph of the Cross as well as the triumph of its Victim which inspires...the Vexilla Regis" which is the hymn sung at Vespers during Passiontide. This hymn was "written for a special occasion. The Emperor Justin II and his wife had sent a relic of the true Cross to Queen Radegunde for the convent at Poitiers." Venantius Fortunatus [d. AD 600], who has a lifetime of writing occasional verse to his credit, was inspired by this occasion to poetry of supreme excellence in hymns which 'combine a deep sincerity and a fervour of poetic feeling and religious thought with high dignity, strength and skill of expression.' ... Nor could he let the occasion pass without addressing a long elegiac poem to the Emperor to honour him for this gift" (Connelly pp 79-80).

As you pray your evening prayers during these last two weeks of Lent, known as Passiontide, I offer you this hymn sung during Vespers in the Divine Office, for your edification:

Behold the standard of the King. The Cross gleams forth its mystery: On it the Son of God as (Dan Atoned on earth for sinners all,

 η is side was pierced by cruel lance That drew out water from η is Blood, To cleanse our souls from ev'ry stain, And nourish them with its pure stream.

O Gree that shines with beauty rare, Ennobled by Christ's precious Blood, The chose you as the royal bed Go rest This sacred limbs in death.

O blessèd were your rugged arms, From which the whole world's ransom hung. You bore the weight of sacrifice Ghat snatched from greedy hell its prey.

Mail, holy altar, Victim hail, For all the glory of that Cross, By which Life chose and welcomed death, And dying gave us life once more.

Ŋail, holy Cross, our only hope, Wash all our guilt and crimes away, Increase our grace while we adore In honor of your victory.

Let ev'ry soul sing in your praise, Salvation's Fount, O Grinity, For ever cherish those redeemed Ghrough that great mystery, the Cross. Amen.

THE FOUR PASSIONS OF HOLY WEEK

In the Traditional Latin Mass, all four gospel accounts of the Passion of the Lord are proclaimed during the Masses of Holy Week beginning with the Passion according to St. Matthew on Palm Sunday, followed by the Passion according to St. Mark on Tuesday; the Passion according to St. Luke on Wednesday (also known as Spy Wednesday - when Judas betrayed the Lord); and finally the Passion according to St. John on Good Friday.

WHAT IS TENEBRAE?

The word 'tenebrae' refers to darkness. Tenebrae is the Traditional nocturnal office of psalms and readings prayed during the Triduum. A hearse of candles is lit (a singular triangular candelabra of 15 candles), each of which is extinguished one by one at the end of each of 14 psalms. The readings each day from the first Nocturne are from the Lamentations: the second Nocturne from St. Augustine; the third Nocturne from St. Paul. Mons. Pierre Batiffol writes: "And then came the 'triduum,' the last three ferias of the Holy Week, and the office assumes the amplitude which characterizes the most solemn anniversaries." (History of the Roman Breviary, 1912. p. 92). It is believed that the Roman Office of the Triduum is so ancient, that it "already existed at Rome in the sixth century in much the same state as now" (ibid. fn.3, p. 92). Traditionally, Masses have been celebrated in the daytime and Tenebrae at night: "The office commenced at midnight...At the night office of Maundy Thursday, celebrated at S. John Lateran, the basilica was lit up as usual: but on Good Friday, when the office was sung at Holy Cross in Jerusalem, all the lights were extinguished one after another, so that at the end of the Benedictus only one remained alight, which was then hid behind the altar until the next day...in token that the Light of the world was extinguished. Christ being dead, and that darkness was upon the face of the whole earth. The night office of Easter Eve was celebrated in the dark, only one lamp being suffered to be lit for the reader" (p. 93). In 1955, the Holy Week services were reformed, and Tenebrae switched places with the Masses and services at the altar which had previously been celebrated in the daytime. We will celebrate Tenebrae at 9 am during the Triduum. Thursday and Friday will be a shortened version in English lasting about 45 minutes. Saturday morning will be the full Latin office lasting approx 2 hours.
