SEPTUAGESIMA SEASON JANUARY 31ST - FEBRUARY 16TH

Septuagesima is a series of 3 Sundays prior to Ash-Wednesday during which the liturgical color shifts to violet; the Alleluia is suppressed until Easter; and the *Gloria* and *Te Deum* are both limited to feasts. It is pre-Lenten and meant to help prepare for Lent by stages. While ordinarily, the parish observes two liturgical calendars for the sake of celebrating both the Traditional Latin Mass and the modern English Mass; during these three Sundays, as we have done in past years, we will celebrate all Masses during Septuagesima in Latin according to the 1962 Missal.

FROM THE DESK OF FR ERIC ANDERSEN

Septuagesima

Next Saturday we will enter into the season called Septuagesima. This is also referred to as "Pre-Lent". It begins with First Vespers of Sunday (always prayed on Saturday evening) at 5 pm. Vespers will begin with the singing of the Alleluia, as usual, but at the very end of Vespers, we will sing Benedicamus Domino, Alleluia, Alleluia; Deo Gratias, Alleluia, Alleluia. (Let us bless the Lord, Alleluia, Alleluia; Thanks be to God, Alleluia, Alleluia.) as we do at Eastertime; and after this First Vespers, the Alleluia will remain silent until the Easter Vigil when we will sing the double Alleluia once again.

Then what? Septuagesima will look like Lent, with Violet Vestments; No *Gloria* except on rare feasts, no *Te Deum* except on rare feasts, and no Alleluia at all. During Septuagesima there can still be flowers on the altar and there can still be organ music in the church. But when Lent begins, the flowers will disappear and the organ will be silent other than to support the singing when needed. When Lent begins, the Lenten penances begin. Be thinking about what you will do for Lent? We will distribute a planning worksheet next week to help you prepare. More on Septuagesima in next week's bulletin.

Beginning the Bible

One practice that I would especially recommend at the beginning of Septuagesima is to begin the Bible at the very beginning. You will notice if you look at the daily readings in the Office of Matins, that the reading for Septuagesima Sunday is Genesis Chapter 1:1-26. Priests who pray the traditional Roman Breviary will be reading Genesis for several weeks. Of course, you can make quicker progress than that, and get started to read the Bible in a year. Be sure you have a Catholic edition of the Bible. My top choice is to recommend the Douay-Rheims published by Loreto Publications, which is the traditional Catholic Bible in English. Another option is the translation by Monsignor Ronald Knox from the mid 20th century currently published by Baronius Press.
