THIS SUNDAY'S SECOND COLLECTION

This Sunday, November 4th for the Society of the Propagation of the Faith (World Missions). Thank you.

FROM THE DESK OF FR. ERIC ANDERSEN

This past Friday the Church celebrated the Commemoration of All Souls. This is a day when it is customary for priests to celebrate 3 Masses for the Dead. Normally a priest is to celebrate one Mass per day but he is given permission to celebrate 3 Masses on Christmas Day and All Soul's Day. Early Friday morning, Fr. Boyle and I both went to the church to pray our morning Office as we normally do (The Office for the Dead on this day), then he celebrated his first of three Masses: a Low Latin Requiem Mass with a server at 7 am. The Church was still empty other than one woman and myself in attendance. At 7:30 am, I took over as altar server for his second Latin Requiem Mass - this time with a congregation. I have written before about how much I appreciate an opportunity to serve Mass for another priest. I find it humbling and so beautiful to be of service to Jesus Christ the High Priest and so close to Him in His Holy Sacrifice through the ministry of the priest offering the Mass.

At 8 am, we switched places and Fr. Boyle served for me as I celebrated my first of three Masses: a Low Latin Requiem Mass. The church was empty at this point other than one man in attendance in the pews.

After Mass, I went to the parish office briefly and then returned to continue praying the Office for the Dead and then celebrated my second Mass of the day at Noon - a Low Latin Requiem Mass. As I write this it is Friday afternoon and I am working on the bulletin and anticipating celebrating my third Mass: a Sung Latin Requiem Mass with a guest choir: Schola Cantus Angelorum, who always sing so beautifully, especially the Dies Irae.

As I knelt in the quiet church this morning praying the Office for the Dead and observing the first quiet Requiem Mass being offered by Fr. Boyle, it struck me how different it was from what many Catholics experience today. Here I was in attendance at the Work of GOD, being offered according to the ancient Roman Rite. What a privilege to be praying in the church simultaneous to the prayer of the priest at the altar working hard for the good of the holy souls in purgatory. How amazing and how rare these days. We are so privileged at St. Stephen's to have this ministry of the ancient rite of the Mass. If only people could see the profundity of this, our parish church would be bursting at the seams with humble souls who would come to pray and assist at Mass.

During this Octave of All Saints, the Church offers a Plenary Indulgence for visiting a cemetery and praying for the dead. It is also customary to offer Daily Masses for the Dead each day during this octave. We will be doing so here this Monday through Thursday at all the Masses. If you wish to begin or end your day in a profound peace of soul, I invite you to join us. Please see the bulletin for the days and times of all our weekday Masses.

A WORD FROM ARCHBISHOP SAMPLE

Dear Parishioners:

October 30, 2018

The U.S. bishops are joining together in a commitment of prayer and reparation leading up to the bishops' general assembly, where we will be making critical decisions in response to the clergy sexual abuse crisis. With my brother bishops across the nation, I will be dedicating myself to seven days of intensified prayer and fasting, from Monday, November 5, through Sunday, November 11. The intentions for this period of prayer and sacrifice are three-fold:

- For the healing and support of all victims of clergy sexual abuse.
- For the conversion and just punishment of the perpetrators and concealers of sexual abuse.
- For the strength of the bishops to be holy shepherds in protecting and leading our sheep from all harm.

If you feel called to do so, you are welcome to join me in praying for these intentions. I would also be grateful for any prayers for me and my brother bishops during our general assembly, that we may follow the guidance of the Holy Spirit in responding to the tragedy of clergy sexual abuse in the Church.

Please be assured of my prayers for you, as well.

Visiting a Cemetery: An indulgence is granted the Christian faithful who devoutly visit a cemetery and pray, if only mentally, for the dead. This indulgence is applicable only to the souls in purgatory. This indulgence is a plenary one from November 1 through November 8 and can be gained on each one of these days. On the other days of the year this indulgence is a partial one. (Coemeterii visitatio. Grant #13. Enchiridion Indulgentiarum, 1986).

Prayer for the Dead: "Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace. Amen." [A partial indulgence, applicable only to the souls in purgatory (Requiem aeternam. Grant #46)].

2018 SEMINARIAN APPEAL FOLLOW-UP

Thank you to all who have participated. Please consider giving to the 2018 Seminarian appeal. The Archdiocese of Portland presently has 30 men in formation for the priesthood and in the next five years we will ordain an average of 2-3 priests a year. Also, we project that in the next five years an average of 2-3 priests will retire each year in the archdiocese. We need the resources not only to replace our beloved senior priests, but to ensure that we are able to continue recruiting, educating and forming men for the priesthood here in the Archdiocese of Portland for many years to come.

Education and formation expenses alone can cost up to \$50,000 annually for one seminarian. On average, seminarians attend seminary for 6 years, and can study for up to 10—or \$500,000. I know this is a lot, but it is an investment in the future of the local Catholic Church.
