FROM THE DESK OF FR. ERIC ANDERSEN

Our nation is very divided. Mob rule is being attempted by groups in society who have given up on civilized behavior and are resorting to screaming, intimidation and violence trying to force their will upon those who disagree with them. Adults are throwing temper tantrums in public trying to get their way. Recent news footage shows adults pounding and screaming against the doors of the Supreme Court in our nation's capital after the confirmation of Judge Kavanaugh.

In 1948, Venerable Fulton Sheen wrote: "We have in the world reactions against reactions; revolts against revolts; the reactionary and the liberal are on a seesaw, and think they are going places because they are going up and down or see their momentary triumph over their opponent. The new liberals are at war against the old liberals; the new rebels in rebellion against the old rebels. The liberal of today will be the reactionary of tomorrow. This so-called liberalism is only a reaction against the latest liberalism (Communism and the Conscience of the West. p. 20).

That which Sheen wrote about Communistic governments in the 1940s can be applied to the ideologically driven mobs of today: "Since all personal freedom implies reason, it follows that the denial of personal freedom necessarily makes a revolution irrational. ...not one of persuasion, but compulsion, and compulsion is the expression of the will, not the expression of human reason. ...totalitarianism is the rule of the collective will which destroys personal will" (p. 103f).

In the *Sentences*, Peter Lombard gave this definition: "Free will is a faculty of reason and will whereby the good is chosen, with the help of grace, or evil rejected with the same help." According to the mind of St. Thomas, freedom is "the outcome of the mind's inclination to truth and the will's inclination to goodness" (Pinckaers, <u>The Sources of Christian Ethics</u> p. 381).

Those screaming and pounding on doors are doing so because they cling to evil in the form of abortion and their idol is being threatened. They cannot appeal to reason because their argument is irrational. They cannot appeal to goodness or even the common good because their argument necessarily involves the killing of innocent life. They appeal to screaming and pounding and therefore they are no longer free. They have become slaves to the merciless idol of abortion.

The Truth sets us free. JESUS CHRIST is the Truth. JESUS is the same yesterday, today and forever. If something is true today, it was always true, and it will always be true even if a large number of people disagree with it. The moral law given by GOD is universal. It applies to everyone. It is not meant to take away freedom but to preserve it. Life is precious and we have a duty to defend life: body and soul. Let us continue to work to end the evil of abortion. I join my voice to that of Archbishop Sample in supporting Measure 106. Please join me in voting YES on 106 to stop all taxpayer money from paying for abortions in Oregon.
