FROM THE DESK OF FR. ERIC ANDERSEN

Extra-ordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHCs)

Next Sunday, we will celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. On this same day, the Archdiocese will implement new liturgical norms for the Ordinary Form of the Mass (2011 Roman Missal), among which will be the kneeling of the faithful after the Agnus Dei; the discontinuation of Communion Services in parishes; and the controlled use of Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHCs). The new requirement for EMHCs is that a person must be approved by the pastor, submitted to the Archbishop, trained according to the teachings of the Church and Archdiocesan norms, and be formally commissioned by the Archbishop or the Pastor for a period of three years.

We have used a limited use of EMHCs here at St. Stephen's. This limited use is based upon the directives of various Church documents. An instruction on Communion under both kinds warns pastors: "To avoid creating confusion, certain practices are to be avoided and eliminated where such have emerged in particular Churches: ...— the habitual use of extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion at Mass thus arbitrarily extending the concept of "a great number of the faithful" (Ecclesiae de mysterio art. 8 §2). Similarly, "Only out of true necessity is there to be recourse to the assistance of extraordinary ministers in the celebration of the Liturgy. Such recourse is not intended for the sake of a fuller participation of the laity but rather, by its very nature, is supplementary and provisional" (Redemptionis Sacramentum ¶151).

After consulting with the Pastoral Council over the last three months and discussing the matter with Monsignor O'Connor, I have decided to discontinue the habitual use of EMHCs at Mass which means that we will no longer distribute the chalice on Sundays at St. Stephen's. On special occasions when we have several visiting priests, we might distribute the chalice to the faithful. The Pastoral Council had discussed this change happening when the Communion Rail gets installed, but with the new norms in the Archdiocese, and the limited number of men willing to be commissioned, it seems like the best thing is to implement this change now. Next Sunday, June 3rd, we will implement the change.

We will be commissioning a limited number of EMHCs to help with visitation to the sick and homebound. I realize that this might come as a disappointment to some of you. Be assured that you will not be deprived of any grace due to receiving Holy Communion under only one species. The current GIRM (General Instruction of the Roman Missal) published in 2011 teaches: "Sacred Pastors...should instruct the Christian faithful that the Catholic faith teaches that Christ, whole and entire, and the true Sacrament, is received even under only one species, and hence that as regards the resulting fruits, those who receive under only one species are not deprived of any grace that is necessary for salvation" (GIRM ¶252).

TRINITARIAN MUSIC

The mystery of the Holy Trinity is an inexhaustible font for watering the garden of our souls. Just as theologians and philosophers have long wrestled with expressing the three persons of the divine unity in human language, the utter beauty of our triune Godhead has inspired artists across the millennia to explore the beauty of this self-giving, infinitely generative love. The first notated (written-down) musical rhythms paid homage to the Trinity. These so-called 'rhythmic modes' were patterns of three, six, or nine pulses which repeated in all the voices of a polyphonic work. These earliest musical notations that allowed each polyphonic voice to have its own independent (although harmonizing) rhythms, the basic conceptual unit of three pulses were retained and called a 'perfection', as an expression of Trinitarian perfection. The symbol for perfect time was a circle [O]. Rhythmic units of two or four pulses, now predominant in Western music, were called *tempus imperfectum*, and indicated by an incomplete or broken circle [O or C or O]. As a result, all through the first flowering of sacred polyphony in the late-middle ages, the increasingly complex and expressive rhythms created by composers such as Guillaume de Machaut, Leonel Power, and Guillaume DuFay all used a system where the length of each note depended on its relationship to the *perfectio* rather than an absolute value (number of pulses) inherent in the note itself. While this may seem like an obscure historical fact, it reflects the patterns of thought and scales of value of a world in which creative artists based their often innovative work on immutable principles of truth, goodness, and beauty of a world emanating from the eternal and most holy Trinity.
