## **FROM THE DESK OF FR. ERIC ANDERSEN**

This next Sunday marks the beginning of the end. The end, that is, of the liturgical year. What is it that begins that transition? The Feast of the Kingship of Christ, also known as Christ the King. The feast is fairly new, being instituted in 1925 by Pope Pius XI for the last Sunday of October.

The words of Pope Pius XI seem so removed from the reality of the world in which we live today, but these words become all that more prophetic as we recognize the chasm that is continuing to widen between the truth which he writes and the growing unrest that we observe in our world and in our fair city of Portland. Pius XI writes:

“To use the words of Our immortal predecessor, Pope Leo XIII: ‘His empire includes not only Catholic nations, not only baptized persons who, though of right belonging to the Church, have been led astray by error, or have been cut off from her by schism, but also all those who are outside the Christian faith; so that truly the whole of mankind is subject to the power of Jesus Christ.’ [Enc. Annum Sacrum, May 25, 1899.] Nor is there any difference in this matter between the individual and the family or the State; for all men, whether collectively or individually, are under the dominion of Christ. In him is the salvation of the individual, in him is the salvation of society. ‘Neither is there salvation in any other, for there is no other name under heaven given to men whereby we must be saved.’ [Acts iv, 12.] He is the author of happiness and true prosperity for every man and for every nation. ‘For a nation is happy when its citizens are happy. What else is a nation but a number of men living in concord?’ [S. Aug. Ep. ad Macedonium, c. iii.]. If, therefore, the rulers of nations wish to preserve their authority, to promote and increase the prosperity of their countries, they will not neglect the public duty of reverence and obedience to the rule of Christ. What We said at the beginning of Our Pontificate concerning the decline of public authority, and the lack of respect for the same, is equally true at the present day. ‘With God and Jesus Christ,’ we said, ‘excluded from political life, with authority derived not from God but from man, the very basis of that authority has been taken away, because the chief reason of the distinction between ruler and subject has been eliminated. The result is that human society is tottering to its fall, because it has no longer a secure and solid foundation.’ [Enc. Ubi Arcano.]

When once men recognize, both in private and in public life, that Christ is King, society will at last receive the great blessings of real liberty, well-ordered discipline, peace and harmony.” (Enc. *Quas Primas* ¶18-19)

After reading these words, we can understand the original instruction: “The public recitation of the Act of Consecration of the Human Race and of the Litany of the Sacred Heart is of obligation on this feast in all parochial churches, this function to be held in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament exposed in the monstrance.” (Pius XI: Encyc. *Quas primas* of December 11th, 1925; S.R.C.: April 28, 1926.). The Church currently offers a Plenary Indulgence on the feast to the faithful who “publicly recite the act of dedication of the human race to Christ the King” (Grant #2. Manual of Indulgences, USCCB. 1999). We will do so after the Latin Mass next Sunday and again in November for the feast celebrated in the Ordinary Form.

### **2018 SEMINARIAN APPEAL FOLLOW-UP**

Thank you to all who participated last weekend. Please consider giving to the 2018 Seminarian appeal. The Archdiocese of Portland presently has 30 men in formation for the priesthood and in the next five years we will ordain an average of 2 – 3 priests a year. Also, we project that in the next five years an average of 2 – 3 priests will retire each year in the archdiocese. We need the resources not only to replace our beloved senior priests, but to ensure that we are able to continue recruiting, educating and forming men for the priesthood here in the Archdiocese of Portland for many years to come.

Education and formation expenses alone can cost up to \$50,000 annually for one seminarian. On average, seminarians attend seminary for 6 years, and can study for up to 10—or \$500,000. I know this is a lot, but it is an investment in the future of the local Catholic Church.
