### FROM THE DESK OF FR. ERIC ANDERSEN

### The Traditions of the Roman Rite and Holy Week

This past Sunday, by request of the Pastoral Council, we switched the two Masses around so that the English Mass was celebrated at 8 am and the Latin Mass was celebrated at 10:30 am. One thing is very clear: the parish prefers the 10:30 am Mass time. The attendance at the 8 am Mass was very low. I am hoping to get feedback from you, the parishioners. Additionally, Fr. Boyle celebrated a Solemn High Latin Mass on Monday evening for the Solemnity of St. Joseph. I served as Deacon and James Thurman served as Subdeacon. One person shared with us that he felt like he was receiving Holy Communion from the Holy Trinity. The reason for this is made clear by the Solemn Mass in which the Deacon and Subdeacon accompany the priest and assist him at his right and left as he distributes the Sacred Host to the faithful. It is a Trinitarian vision.

Fr. Boyle and I discussed this and we both think it is important that the faithful at St. Stephen's have an opportunity to experience the fullness of the Roman Rite and its traditions which express such a rich spirituality. We would like to celebrate the Solemn Mass with Deacon and Subdeacon once a month at the 10:30 am Mass, and we ask that you reserve judgment on whether or not you like this Mass until you have a chance to experience it a few times and get beyond the awkward stage. We think that you will come to love it as we do.

To that end, Fr. Boyle and I discussed and agreed upon the celebration of part of the Triduum according to the 1956 revision of Holy Week in the 1962 Missal. Looking at Holy Thursday and Good Friday, they are nearly identical to the versions from the Missal of 1970, and yet there is an elegance and an order in these versions that seems more clear cut than the newer versions. We will celebrate Holy Thursday and Good Friday as Solemn Latin Masses/Services and then we will celebrate the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday in English, according to the 2011 Roman Missal, and will be baptizing a catechumen and confirming two young men.

Another wonderful tradition of Holy Week is the proclamation of the four Passion accounts. The Passion according to St. Matthew will be proclaimed on Palm Sunday at the 8 am Latin Mass; whereas the Passion according to St. Mark will be proclaimed at the 10:30 am English Mass (Year B in the Lectionary). The Passion according to St. Mark will be proclaimed at the Latin Mass on Tuesday at Noon. The Passion according to St. Luke will be proclaimed at the Latin Mass on Wednesday evening at 6:45 pm. The Passion according to St. John will be proclaimed on Good Friday at the 3 pm service. Please join us for as much as you can. If you are able, take Good Friday off from work. It is a fast day and there is much over which to ponder, about which to pray, and for which to prepare on that day.

### GOOD FRIDAY ABSTINENCE AND FAST

Catholics 14 years and older must abstain from meat on the on **Good Friday**. Catholics ages 18 to 59 are to fast on Good Friday. To fast means to eat one full meal. Two smaller meals may also be taken for good health but together should not equal a full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted but liquids are allowed.

### THE SOUND OF HOLY WEEK

Holy Week abounds with things we hear at no other time during the year. Just as the liturgies of Palm Sunday, Holy (Maundy) Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter are unique in form and importance, each is marked by musical and non-musical sounds that help imprint the meaning of Our Lord's Passion and Resurrection on us. The festive Hosannas of the Palm procession give way to the chant of the Gradual, Christus factus est (Christ became obedient for our sakes unto death, even the death of the cross), which we hear again on Thursday. The temporary return of the Gloria in excelsis and organ on Thursday is followed by aural fasting even from the usual sanctus bell, which is replaced by a wooden clapper, the crotalus. On Good Friday, the traditional chant for the Passion Gospel provides a narrator (chronista), Jesus, and other speakers (synagoga) each with his own melody and range, a dramatization of this central action in the plan of salvation. We also speak rather than sing the Lord's Prayer that day. And just as the Holy Cross is displayed to us on Friday accompanied by the threefold chant, "Behold the wood of the Cross," the light of Christ is brought into the dark church on Holy Saturday evening with its threefold announcement, Lumen Christi, with the firm restoration of bells and the organ to our celebration. Finally, on Easter morning, the sequence, Victimae Paschali landes, begins by proclaiming the theological truth of the Resurrection and then allows its first witnesses to recount the visible, physical reality of the Risen Christ, set to glorious pairs of poetic and musical phrases. In these ways, our mother, the Church, gives us markers or signposts in sound to make more vivid and memorable the great truths they convey.
