

FROM THE DESK OF FR. ERIC ANDERSEN

Today, we celebrate the World Day of Prayer for Vocations. Generally, this means that we promote vocations to the priesthood and religious life among our youth. I would like to suggest that the remote preparation for vocational discernment should look the same for marriage, religious life, or priesthood. Our young boys and girls would all benefit from knowing that beginning with their baptism, they are consecrated to God. They belong to God who loves them St. Paul explains what this type of ordinary consecrated life looks like: "He that is without a wife is solicitous for the things that belong to the Lord: how he may please God. ...and the unmarried woman and the virgin thinks on the things of the Lord: that she may be holy both in body and in spirit' (1 Cor. 7: 32b, 34). St. Paul here illustrates the remote preparation of every Catholic boy or girl for their future vocation.

If a boy is concerned with pleasing the Lord, he will save himself a lot of trouble in life. He will also understand that by his very maleness—his masculinity—he is priestly. A boy who understands that he has a share in the priesthood will make different decisions as he matures. He will prepare himself to lay down his life for the sake of others. He will be noble of heart and pure of heart because the welfare of others depends on it: whether that be his future wife and children, or those entrusted to his care as a priest.

If a girl thinks on the things of the Lord: that she may be holy both in body and in spirit, she will prepare herself for her vocation, whatever it may be. If she understands her femininity to be bridal in nature, then whether her future decisions lead her to the sacrament of matrimony (the office of motherhood), or to consecrated religious life (as a bride of Christ), she will be prepared in heart, mind, and body to embrace God's call to either.

In the Sacrament of Matrimony, God is the true Spouse of the marriage: husband and wife are to mediate God's love to one another till death do they part; and at death they hand the spouse over to God. They cannot mediate to another what they do not have. If an unmarried man has not been solicitous for the things of God, then how can he enter into marriage and offer God's love to his wife? Likewise, if a woman has not cultivated holiness in body and spirit, thinking on the things of God, how can she offer God's love to her husband?

The remote preparation beginning in childhood must prepare boys and girls to know that God is the source of all love, either in marriage or in religious and priestly life. If the unmarried are solicitous for the things of the Lord, then when it comes time to choose their vocation, they will be ready to say yes - either to God's love mediated through another, or to God's immediate (un-mediated) love. Religious Life and Priesthood are like marriage in that one chooses God as the Spouse now, rather than waiting until death. A priest identifies himself with Jesus and takes the Church as his own bride. A consecrated virgin identifies herself with the Bride of Christ in taking Jesus for her own Bridegroom. With such an understanding, our children will see the vocational choices before them as being good, and a path to heaven through either married life, priesthood, or consecrated life.

WHERE ARE THE REAL CATHOLIC COMPOSERS?

Past centuries provide many examples of excellent Catholic composers who created both sacred and secular music, while maintaining a close tie to Mother Church--just think of William Byrd, Anton Bruckner, César Franck, Antonín Dvořák, or Olivier Messiaen. But what of living composers of art music who are also clearly Catholic in their lives and works?

James MacMillan (b. 1959) has emerged in the past three decades as Britain's leading composer and the most important living Catholic composer of art music. A Dominican tertiary and proud Scotsman, he writes concert works of great intellectual depth, emotional intensity, and luminous beauty. These are not easy-going works to accompany meditation. Rather, they engage forcefully and directly with timeless questions of truth, beauty, and goodness and often put their creator's Catholic faith front and center, even in ostensibly secular contexts. You'll find many of his orchestral, chamber, and operatic works online. MacMillan has also become a prominent commentator on matters religious and artistic. He doesn't pull his punches, calling out Catholic 'contemporary' music as "a pitiful laughing stock" produced by a misplaced sense of democratization that "like most ideas shaped by 1960s Marxist ideology ... has proved an utter failure." It's rare to find a Catholic artist of great stature who witnesses to Catholic truth both in his creative work and in his growing role as a public intellectual.

In America, one of our finest Catholic composers is Californian, Frank LaRocca (b. 1951). An award-winning professor at UC -East Bay, he rejected the musical modernism of his university instructors early in his career, and has forged a highly personal, expressive musical language. His most recent large work, A Rose in Winter - the life of Saint Rita of Cascia, for chorus, orchestra, soloists and organ, with a libretto by Matthew Lickona, was premiered in 2015. Like almost all of his output in the last 15 years, he regards A Rose as a work oriented strongly toward the 'new evangelism'. For more about both LaRocca and MacMillan, look up the American's talk, "The Apologetics of Beauty".

If you have time, also look up works by two additional living composers: Latvian-Canadian Imant Raminsh (b. 1943) and Latvian Rihards Dubra (b. 1964), both of whom work in idioms influenced by chant and by music of the eastern churches.
